The MAIN Causes of WWI

<u>Militarism</u> - policy of building up strong military forces to prepare for war.

<u>Alliances</u> - Agreements between nations to aid and protect one another.

<u>Imperialism</u> - The seizure (takeover) of a country or territory by another country.

<u>Nationalism</u> - pride in or devotion to one's country.

The MAIN Causes of WWI: Militarism

- → Long term military buildup
- European countries wanted to be stronger than each other
- \rightarrow Germany had become the strongest in mainland Europe
- → Results
 - France, Italy, Japan, and the United States started to develop more advanced weapons


The MAIN Causes of WWI: Alliances

→ Support other countries if they are attacked
→ Examples:

♦ Triple Alliance: <u>Central Powers</u>

- Turkey, Austria-Hungary, Germany, Italy
- ♦ Triple Entente: <u>Allies</u>
 - 🔹 France, Russia, USA, Great Britain (FRUG)

The MAIN Causes of WWI: Imperialism

- \rightarrow Dominating countries politically and economically
- \rightarrow Closely linked to industry
- > Need for raw materials and markets
- → Causes tension
- → Examples
 - → Russo-Japanese War over Korea
 - ightarrow France and Great Britain nearly went to war in Africa

The MAIN Causes of WWI: Imperialism



The MAIN Causes of WWI: Nationalism

 → Belief that national interests and national unity should be placed ahead of global cooperation
→ Self-interest to guide foreign affairs

→ Examples:

- \rightarrow Germanic peoples (Germany/Austria) share common heritage and goals
- \rightarrow Russia was regarded as the protector of Slavic peoples




